

DIRECTOR




Stefan Sittig (Director/Choreographer) has a multi-disciplined theater background as a director, choreographer, fight director, movement coach, educator and podcast host. He has worked on 100+ productions including in New York City (Off-Broadway), internationally in Brazil, Uruguay and Canada, at various regional theatres, and in most of the major theatres in the Washington, DC area. Stefan is an Artistic Associate at MetroStage where he has directed and choreographed several productions including Poetry & Tango (featuring Broadway actor and Helen Hayes award winner Natascia Diaz), Jason Odell Williams' fast paced dramedy Church & State, Sheridan Morley's musical Noel & Gertie and the Terrence McNally plays Mothers & Sons and Frankie and Johnny in the Clair de Lune.

Stefan received the Broadway World Award for Best Director for Frankie and Johnny as well as a nomination for Best Director for Mothers & Sons. Frankie & Johnny also won the BWA for Best Play and Mothers & Sons won for Best Supporting Performer. Both plays also received nominations for Best Play of the season and the entire adult casts of both productions were nominated in their respective categories. Additional directing credits include Trabajadores (the World Premiere of the Spanish version of Stephen Schwartz's Working), Cole Porter's Anything Goes and Red Hot & Cole, Jerry Herman's Jerry's Girls and the 60's revue Beehive. Other DC credits include The Kennedy Center, Signature Theatre, Studio Theatre, Olney Theatre Center, 1st Stage, The Washington Savoyards, Atlas Performing Arts Center, Open Circle Theatre, Adventure Theatre, The American Century Theater and the Workhouse Arts Center, where he recently choreographed The Mystery of Edwin Drood.

Stefan is on the faculty at George Mason University's School of Theater where he teaches Musical Theatre and Stage Combat. He holds an MFA in Theatre from Virginia Commonwealth University and a BA in Drama and English Literature from The University of Virginia. He also produces and hosts the podcast American Theatre Artists Online, available on iTunes and Podbean, where he has interviewed many Tony, Emmy and Golden Globe award winners and nominees.

Stefan was raised in Rio de Janeiro, Brazil, is half-Uruguayan, and is a native Spanish and Portuguese speaker and fluent in French. His love of musical theatre, combined with his experiences growing up in Latin America have often guided his artistic work. MUSIC DIRECTOR

DIRECTOR'S NOTE

"In these difficult times, with a global pandemic, a war abroad, and a divided community here at home, what we need more than ever is to lift our spirits! Musical theatre, perhaps more than any art form, is engineered to help us escape our everyday woes, take us out of the present, and transport us to another world, often with laughter and wonderful music and dancing. Just like Fred Astaire, Ginger Rogers and Shirley Temple helped get Americans through the Great Depression, the "musical of the box that is juke" (as Clio calls it in the show) can serve a similar purpose in our present times – provide escape and relief from our daily worries.

XANADU is a vibrant musical, full of campy good fun (and yes, roller skating) and while it certainly does help us escape, it also has a deeper message. The book of the musical, by the Tony Award nominated playwright Douglas Carter Beane (The Nance, The Little Dog Laughed and the screenplay for To Wong Foo...), has a strong central theme: Be true to yourself but don't be afraid to open up and reach out to others for help, for that is how you can become your best self. While the show is definitely irreverent, there is still a human core to Sonny and Clio (disguised throughout most of the show as Kira). They are both looking for artistic inspiration and love in the most heartfelt of ways. That is their true quest - that is their XANADU!

There is also a secondary, but just as important, message in the script – artistic creation is difficult! Just like Sonny, all who create art (or try to) struggle to find the right style, the right color, and the right method. The creative spirit lives in all of us, whether we are making a meal for our family, redesigning an old space, or painting a picture, artistic creation requires inspiration and self-reflection and lots of hard work! It is not easy being an artist, there are many challenges, and not many extrinsic rewards and inspiration can be hard to find. But we need artists, and we should work harder as a community to support them. Without them we are lost as a people. The artists' function in culture and society, particularly in difficult times, is an important one beyond just entertainment – they help us re-invent and rediscover our purpose and ourselves. Just like Clio (disguised as Kira) inspires Sonny to find his true self both as an artist and as a human being.

I remember being a child, dancing, singing (and yes, roller skating) down the streets of Rio de Janeiro (where I grew up), to the soundtrack of the film XANADU. It was the early 80s, a new decade full of promise and possibility. The music of that time, from Olivia Newton John to ELO, seemed to point towards optimism, excitement, artistic reinvention, and the hope for a better tomorrow. The music and its message reached across the globe inspiring us all. While the rest of the 80s may not have lived up to the heady promise of those first few years, its music is still a reminder for us to find strength and optimism in creation. Even more so now, as we find ourselves in the first years of a new turbulent decade, perhaps a bit weary, it's a reminder we should remain hopeful for better times.

Perhaps this show "will be guiding you" to a better place and maybe as you leave the theatre, you are filled with optimism to recapture some of the "magic" of the early 80s. I believe it's possible...I hope you do too. As Kira sings in the show:

You have to believe we are Magic Nothing can stand in our way You have to believe we are Magic Don't let your aim ever stray -Stefan Sittig




